DESCRIPTION OF AVAILABLE SPACE, FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT

Instruction, laboratory training, and related educational activities will be conducted at Burleson Dental, located at 664 SW Wilshire Boulevard, Burleson, Texas 76028.

Classroom lectures and didactic instruction will be provided in a designated lecture/training room within the dental facility. Clinical laboratory instruction and hands-on training will be conducted in the dental operatories under appropriate supervision and in accordance with applicable safety and infection control standards.

The school has access to and utilizes dental equipment and facilities necessary to support the instructional program, including dental chairs, dental radiography (X-ray) equipment, sterilization equipment (autoclave), and laboratory work areas. These facilities and equipment are made available to Milestone Dental Assisting School through a written facility-use agreement and are used exclusively for educational and training purposes during scheduled instructional activities.

Tuition does not include Hepatitis B vaccination series, fees to take TSBDE certification examination for Radiology, Infection Control, Jurisprudence or Nitrous Oxide monitoring and Scrubs.

Methods of Payment for Tuition: Credit Card, Debit Card, Check, Cash, Third Party financing
Payment Options:

1. \$3500 when paying tuition in full 1 week before selected course start date.
2. \$3000 when paying tuition in full for Active Military Status
3. Payment Plan - \$350 per week, starting 1 week before selected course start date and every week thereafter before the start of the class for that week for a total of 11 payments. \$3850 total

***Payment Plan Terms**

Student agrees to pay tuition in eleven (11) weekly installments of \$350.00 each, for a total payment amount of \$3,850.00. The first payment shall be due one (1) week prior to the selected course start date, with each subsequent payment due weekly thereafter before the start of that week's class.

No interest is charged on the payment plan. However, if any portion of the difference between the cash price and the total payment plan amount is deemed a finance charge under applicable law, the parties acknowledge that the transaction may be subject to the federal Truth in Lending Act (Regulation Z), including any required disclosures of the Annual Percentage Rate (APR), finance charge, total of payments, and related credit terms.

*Students who wish to pay with one of the payment plans must bring the full specified payment to each class and turn it in to the instructor before the class period begins. If a student fails to bring his/her payment to any class period he/she will be asked to leave and will not be allowed to continue with the class.

*Students who wish to pay with Credit Card. There will be a Credit Card Processing Fee of 5%

DEFINITIVE CLASS SCHEDULE

Classes will be offered on Friday (8am to 5pm) or Saturday (8am to 1pm)

Friday classes will meet one day a week for 8 hours (4 hours of lecture and 4 hours of hands-on lab for 10 weeks). Breaks for Day Classes- a 15-minute break in the morning at 9:55 a.m. until 10:10 and a 15-minute break in the afternoon at 2:55p.m. until 3:10 p.m. Lunch: 1 hour break from 12:00 to 1:00.

By the end of the 10th week the 80 hours of externship can begin at Dental Offices in the DFW area. If a student needs to go beyond the 12 weeks for externship to be completed, the completion certificate will be withheld until externship hours are completed.

Saturday Classes will meet one day a week for Makeup classes sessions (4 Hours of either lecture or hands-on lab). Breaks for Day classes – a 15-minute break in the morning at 9:55 a.m. until 10:10

ADMISSION/ENROLLMENT POLICIES

Students applying for this course are required to:

- a. interview with a representative or director of the school
- b. takes a tour of the school and equipment
- c. present proof of high school diploma or GED
- d. be at least 17 years of age (applicants under age 18 require written permission from a parent or legal guardian to enroll.

CREDIT FOR PREVIOUS EDUCATION, TRAINING, OR EXPERIENCE

Milestone Dental Assisting School does not award academic credit. Students may request an evaluation of previous education, training, or work experience related to dental assisting. Requests must be submitted in writing prior to enrollment and must include documentation supporting the student's prior education, training, certifications, or relevant work experience.

The School Director will review the documentation and determine whether the applicant has demonstrated competency in specific course objectives. If competency is verified, the school may grant a reduction in training hours for the applicable subject area, provided such reduction does not conflict with applicable state laws, regulatory requirements, or program completion standards.

Any adjustment to training requirements will be documented in the student's file. Tuition adjustments, if applicable, will be calculated in accordance with the school's published tuition and refund policies. The school

reserves the right to require all students to complete the full program of instruction regardless of prior education, training, or experience when necessary to ensure achievement of program objectives and competency standards.

CANCELLATION AND REFUND POLICIES

CANCELLATION POLICY

A full refund will be made to any student who cancels the enrollment contract within 72 hours (until midnight of the third day excluding Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays) after the enrollment contract is signed. A full refund will also be made to any student who cancels enrollment within the student's first three scheduled class days, except that the school may retain not more than \$100 in any administrative fees charged, as well as items of extra expense that are necessary for the portion of the program attended and stated separately on the enrollment agreement.

REFUND POLICY

1. Refund computations will be based on scheduled course time of class attendance through the last date of attendance. Leaves of absence, suspensions and school holidays will not be counted as part of the scheduled class attendance.
2. The effective date of termination for refund purposes will be the earliest of the following:
 - The last day of attendance, if the student is terminated by the school.
 - The date of receipt of written notice from the student; or
 - Ten school days following the last date of attendance.
3. If tuition and fees are collected in advance of entrance, and if after expiration of the 72-hour cancellation privilege the student does not enter school, not more than \$100 in any administrative fees charged shall be retained by the school for the entire residence program or synchronous distance education course.
4. If a student enters a residence or synchronous distance education program and withdraws or is otherwise terminated after the cancellation period, the school or college may retain not more than \$100 in any administrative fees charged for the entire program. The minimum refund of the remaining tuition and fees will be the pro rata portion of tuition, fees, and other charges that the number of hours remaining in the portion of the course or program for which the student has been charged after the effective date of termination bears to the total number of hours in the portion of the course or program for which the student has been charged, except that a student may not collect a refund if the student has completed 75 percent or more of the total number of hours in the portion of the program for which the student has been charged on the effective date of termination. (More simply, the refund is based on the precise number of course time hours the student has paid for, but not yet used, at the point of termination, up to the 75% completion mark, after which no refund is due.)
5. Refunds for items of extra expense to the student, such as books, tools, or other supplies are to be handled separately from refund of tuition and other academic fees. The student will not be required to purchase instructional supplies, books and tools until such time as these materials are required. Once these materials are purchased, no refund will be made. For full refunds, the school can withhold costs for these types of items from the refund as long as they were necessary for the portion of the program attended and separately stated in the enrollment agreement. Any such items not required for the portion of the program attended must be included in the refund.

6. A student who withdraws for a reason unrelated to the student's academic status after the 75 percent completion mark and requests a grade at the time of withdrawal shall be given a grade of "incomplete" and permitted to re-enroll in the course or program during the 12-month period following the date the student withdrew without payment of additional tuition for that portion of the course or program.

7. **Refund Calculations**

Refunds shall be calculated based on the total tuition amount applicable to the student's selected payment option.

- Students who paid the discounted cash price in full (\$3,500.00) shall have any eligible refund calculated based on the \$3,500.00 total tuition amount.
- Students who enrolled under the installment/payment plan (\$3,850.00 total obligation) shall have any eligible refund calculated based on the full \$3,850.00 payment plan amount agreed upon in this Agreement, regardless of the amount paid at the time of withdrawal.

Any non-refundable administrative fees, finance charges, processing fees, or earned charges permitted by law shall be deducted from the refund amount. Refund eligibility shall further be subject to the school's published cancellation and withdrawal policy.

8. A full refund of all tuition and fees is due and refundable in each of the following cases:

- (a) An enrollee is not accepted by the school.
- (b) If the course of instruction is discontinued by the school and this prevents the student from completing the course; or
- (c) If the student's enrollment was procured because of any misrepresentation in advertising, promotional materials of the school, or representations by the owner or representatives of the school.

A full or partial refund may also be due in other circumstances of program deficiencies or violations of requirements for career schools and colleges.

REFUND POLICY FOR STUDENTS CALLED TO ACTIVE MILITARY SERVICE.

A student at the school or college who withdraws from the school or college because of the student being called to active duty in a military service of the United States or the Texas National Guard may elect one of the following options for each program in which the student is enrolled:

- (a) If tuition and fees are collected in advance of the withdrawal, a pro rata refund of any tuition, fees, or other charges paid by the student for the program and a cancellation of any unpaid tuition, fees, or other charges owed by the student for the portion of the program the student does not complete following withdrawal.
- (b) A grade of incomplete with the designation "withdrawn-military" for the courses in the program, other than courses for which the student has previously received a grade on the student's transcript, and the right to re-enroll in the program, or a substantially equivalent program if that program is no longer available, not later than the first anniversary of the date the student is discharged from active military duty without payment of additional tuition, fees, or other charges for the program other than any previously unpaid balance of the original tuition, fees, and charges for books for the program; or

(c) The assignment of an appropriate final grade or credit for the courses in the program, but only if the instructor or instructors of the program determine that the student has:

- (1) Satisfactorily completed at least 90 percent of the required coursework for the program;
and
- (2) Demonstrated sufficient mastery of the program material to receive credit for completing the program

The payment of refunds will be totally completed such that the refund instrument has been negotiated or credited into the proper account(s), within 60 days after the effective date of termination.

DENTAL ASSISTING COURSE

OBJECTIVE /PURPOSE OF COURSE

The Dental Assisting Program is designed to prepare students for entry-level employment as a Dental Assistant in dental offices, specialty practices, and other dental healthcare settings. The program provides instruction in the knowledge, skills, and professional competencies necessary to assist dentists and support patient care in accordance with applicable laws, regulations, and accepted standards of practice.

Students receive classroom instruction, laboratory training, and supervised hands-on experience in a functioning dental office environment. Course content includes dental terminology, infection control and sterilization procedures, chairside assisting techniques, dental radiography, dental charting, patient communication, vital signs assessment, operator preparation and maintenance, instrument identification and processing, emergency procedures, and professional workplace practices.

The program includes practical training designed to develop competency in assisting during dental procedures, exposing and processing dental radiographs, maintaining a safe and sterile clinical environment, preparing treatment rooms, and performing duties commonly assigned to entry-level dental assistants.

Milestone Dental Assisting School provides career preparation services, including resume development assistance, interview preparation, and job placement assistance. However, the school does not guarantee employment.

Upon successful completion of all program requirements, students will be awarded a Certificate of Completion in Dental Assisting. Students who successfully complete the applicable training components will also receive certificates documenting completion of instruction in Dental Radiography, Infection Control and Sterilization Procedures, Dental Charting, and CPR for Healthcare Providers, as applicable.

*The time required to complete this course is 12 weeks for both day and evening classes. The Externship of 80 Clock hours can begin after the 10th week of class and must be completed before the Certificate of Completion will be awarded.

Subject Descriptions (Lec/Lab/EXT/Total)

DA 101 Sterilization Techniques: The students will learn how to prepare a room between patients as well as sterilize instruments after a procedure. They will learn how to disinfect equipment, which items are to be discarded and how to properly run the Autoclave for sterilizing instruments. (02/02/00/04) Prerequisites: Admission to the program

DA 102 Radiography: The student will learn how to take a legible X-ray for the dentist to diagnose decay. A dummy head "Dexter" is provided for practice. Students will learn how X-ray machines work, how to use digital sensors to take X-rays, how to properly protect the patient and themselves from exposure to radiation. (02/04/00/06) Prerequisites: DA 101

DA 103 Dental Assisting Skills: The student will learn how to assist the dentist during dental procedures. They will learn how to properly use HVE and suction, rinse and dry the teeth being worked on, properly passing instruments and what is expected of them as a Dental Assistant. (03/05/00/08) Prerequisites: DA 102

DA 104 Oral Anatomy: Students will learn what is normal and abnormal in the human oral cavity, features of the normal oral cavity including how many teeth, their features, including salivary glands, tongue, cheeks, and other features. The class will also learn about irregularities in the oral cavities. (02/02/00/04) Prerequisites: DA 103

DA 105 Disease Transmission and Infection Control: The student will learn how disease is passed from one person to another and ways to prevent passing germs from being patient to patient and how to protect themselves from acquiring contagious diseases in the dental office. (02/3.5/00/5.5) Prerequisites: DA 104

DA106 Computer Skills and Charting: Almost all dental offices use computers for charting and note taking. The students will learn about the most common software dental offices use. They will learn the basics of the two most common software used, XDR and OpenDental. (02/02/00/04) Prerequisites: DA 105

DA 107 Dental Disease Prevention: The student will learn proper ways to brush and floss, and how to prevent periodontal disease. They will learn how diet affects dental health. (03/02/00/05) Prerequisites: DA 104

DA 108 Impression Materials: The student will learn how to make several different types of impressions. These include impressions for bleaching trays, crowns, temporary crowns and bridges, and permanent crowns and bridges. (04/04/00/08) Prerequisites: DA 107

DA 109 Temporary Crowns: The student will learn to make temporary crowns to continue working with the patient independently once the dentist has completed prep the tooth for a crown. They will learn how to make a crown from impressions. They will also learn how to make a temporary bridge. (02/03/00/05) Prerequisites: DA 108

DA 110 Bleaching Trays: The student will learn proper selection for choosing the correct impression trays for bleaching trays impressions. They will also learn how to pour up a model for a bleaching tray, and how to make the actual tray, how to fit the tray to the patient and how to adjust the tray to allow for a better fit. (01/02/00/03) Prerequisites: DA 108

DA 111 Medical Emergencies: The student will learn what to do in the event of some of the most common medical emergencies and how to handle them. Some of these include fainting, seizures, diabetic insulin shock, obstructed airway and strokes. Students will also learn CPR by a qualified instructor and receive their CPR Certification as required by The Texas State Board of Dental Examiners. (04/04/00/08) Prerequisites: Admission to the program

DA 112 OSHA Standards: The student will learn about OSHA, and how to protect themselves on the job, the roles and responsibilities of the CDC, medical waste management and personal protective equipment. (04/02/00/06)
Prerequisites: Admission to the program

DA 113 Texas State Laws: The student will learn the laws in Texas as it pertains to Dental Assistants. (04/00/00/04)
Prerequisites: Admission to the program

DA 114: Dental Materials: The students will learn about the many different materials used in the dental office such as cements, different types of impression materials, and materials for crowns and bridges, bonding agents, composite materials, Sealants and etchants. (03/03/00/06) Prerequisites: DA 103

DA 115 Root Canals: The student will learn how to assist during a root canal procedure, the set up for the procedure, how to take an X-ray on a tooth having a root canal. (02/02/00/04) Prerequisites: DA 114

DA 116 Fillings: The student will learn the procedure and set up for doing composite and Amalgam fillings. They will learn which instruments are needed and the order in which they are used. (03/02/00/05) Prerequisites: DA 114

DA 117 The Emergency Visit: The student will learn what constitutes an emergency visit in the dental office, how frequently they occur and what procedures are first done once the patient arrives. (02/03/00/05) Prerequisites: DA 113

DA 118 Resume Building and The Job Interviewing: Students will learn how to put together a professional resume, how to dress on Interviews, questions to expect, and what to expect on a working interview. (03/00/00/03)
Prerequisites: DA 101, DA 102, DA 103, DA 104, DA105, DA 106, DA 107, DA 108, DA 109, DA 110, DA 111, DA 112, DA 113, DA 114, DA 115, DA 116, DA 117

DA119 Oral Surgery: Students will learn about different types of oral surgery including placing periodontal dressings and removing sutures. Prerequisites DA 117 (01/1.5/00/2.5)

DA 120 Dental Assisting Externship: During their externship, students will have the opportunity to practice the skills they have gained during their classroom and lab training. They will work in dental offices on actual patients assisting with procedures they have learned in school. (00/00/80/80) Prerequisites: DA 101, DA 102, DA 103, DA 104, DA105, DA 106, DA 107, DA 108, DA 109, DA 110, DA 111, DA 112, DA 113, DA 114, DA 115, DA 116, DA 117, DA 118.

SATISFACTORY PROGRESS AND ACADEMIC PROBATION POLICIES

SATISFACTORY PROGRESS:

The student must maintain a 75% (C) grade average or higher throughout the program, should attend all classes including lab. Should the student receive a grade of average less than 75%, miss any classes or lab, the student will

be placed on probation. During the probation period, the student will be given the opportunity to make up work to bring their grade average back up to 75%.

PROGRESS REPORT:

Grading periods are weekly, and a progress report will be given out at the beginning of every week for the previous week's class. The progress report will include the grade average thus far for tests, quizzes, and lab work. It will also include any areas of concern from the instructor, or areas that need more attention from the student.

ACADEMIC PROBATION:

A student who is not making satisfactory progress as defined above at the completion of a subject class will be placed on academic probation for the next subject class. If a student on academic probation achieves satisfactory progress for the subsequent subject class but does not achieve the required grades to meet overall satisfactory progress for the course, the student may be continued on academic probation for one more subject class. If a student on academic probation fails to achieve satisfactory progress for the first probationary subject class, the student's enrollment will be terminated. The enrollment of a student who fails to achieve overall satisfactory progress for the program at the end of two successive subject classes will be terminated. The student may wait until the next upcoming class to re-enroll at no extra charge for the next 12 months after termination.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

The main goal is not to miss any classes due to the brief amount of time the classes are scheduled for, but the following are guidelines if something unexpected should happen.

The student will be dismissed from the school if more than 25% of the total clock hours of accumulated absences in the classroom occur. Classroom hours, lab and externship hours total 176 hours (25% of this is 44 hours or 5.5 days).

30 minutes to 3 hours and 59 minutes of a day are considered a partial absence and constitutes a half day missed or Total 4 hours. 4 hours to 8 hours are considered a full absence and constitute a full day missed or total 8 hours.

Accumulated absences of more than 5.5 days would exceed the 25% limit. The student is held responsible for all tuition payments in excessive absences which justify termination. According to our re-admittance policy, the student may not return until the next class scheduled. All absentees must contact the lead instructor at least 8 hours prior to the absence and arrange with another student to get notes and missed materials. This does not remove an absence from the student's attendance record but does allow the student to catch up with the remainder of the class.

A request for a leave of absence must be addressed with the Director of the school. If a leave of absence is necessary for medical purposes, the student may re-enroll within 12 months at no additional charge. Any student needing to miss a single class session must contact the lead instructor in advance for the assignment and the material expected to be covered.

Excused absences will be regarded as absences for the attendance requirements of this program.

Makeup work is available for the class missed but will not erase the absence. If a student has a medical emergency or personal crisis, the situation will be evaluated on an individual basis by the Program Director. The possibility of making up classes will be determined by the Program Director and school staff. If the student takes a grade of incomplete, they have the right to re-enroll in the program during the 12-month period following the date the

student withdraws and completes those incomplete subjects without payment of additional tuition but must wait until the next scheduled class.

Day Classes: Class starts at 8:00 a.m. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of each class **and** when returning from lunch.

Evening Classes: Class starts at 3 p.m. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of each class.

TARDINES POLICY

Students are expected to arrive on time and be prepared to participate in all scheduled classroom, laboratory, clinical, and externship activities. Regular and punctual attendance is essential to successful completion of the Dental Assisting Program and the achievement of program learning objectives. A student who arrives after the scheduled start time of a class, laboratory session, or clinical training activity will be considered tardy. Tardiness may result in missed instructional content, skills demonstrations, laboratory exercises, or clinical experiences that cannot be duplicated during the scheduled class session.

For attendance purposes, the following definitions apply:

Tardy: Arrival up to fifteen (15) minutes after the scheduled start time.

Half-Day Miss: Arrival more than thirty (30) minutes and up to four (4) hours after the scheduled start time.

Absence: Failure to attend a scheduled class session or miss more than four (4) hours of scheduled instruction.

Three (3) recorded tardies will be converted to one (1) absence for attendance record purposes.

Students are responsible for completing all missed instructional time, assignments, laboratory exercises, clinical activities, and competencies resulting from tardiness or absence in accordance with the school's attendance and make-up work policies. Repeated tardiness may result in counseling by school administration and may adversely affect a student's academic progress if required instructional hours and competencies are not completed. Students who arrive excessively late may be denied entry to a class, laboratory, or clinical session when late entry would disrupt instruction, compromise patient safety, or interfere with the learning environment. Any missed instructional time will be recorded according to the school's attendance policy.

Milestone Dental Assisting School reserves the right to require additional make-up instruction, laboratory training, clinical practice, or other educational activities necessary to ensure that students complete all required instructional hours and demonstrate competency in program objectives prior to graduation.

LEAVES OF ABSENCE POLICY

A request for a leave of absence must be addressed with the Director of the school. Any student needing to miss a single class session must contact the lead instructor in advance for the assignment and the material expected to be covered. Excused absences will be regarded as absences for the attendance requirements of this program.

Makeup work is available for the class missed but will not erase the absence. If a student has a medical emergency or personal crisis, the situation will be evaluated on an individual basis by the Program Director. The possibility of making up class(s) will be determined by the Program Director and school staff. The school director may grant a leave of absence after determining that good cause has been shown. A student may take no more than 2 leaves of absence for not more than a total of 30 days in a 12-month period and take a grade of incomplete. They have the right to re-enroll in the program during the 12-month period following the date the student withdraws and complete those incomplete subjects without payment of additional tuition.

MAKE-UP WORK

No more than 5% of the total course time hours for a course may be made up. Make-up work shall:

- (1) Be supervised by an instructor approved for the class being made up.
- (2) Require the student to demonstrate substantially the same level of knowledge or competence expected of a student who attended the scheduled class session.
- (3) Be completed within two weeks of the end of the grading period during which the absence occurred.
- (4) Be documented by the school as being completed, recording the date, time, duration of the make-up session, and the name of the supervising instructor; and
- (5) Be signed and dated by the student to acknowledge the make-up session.

SCHOOL POLICY REGARDING STUDENT CONDUCT

We expect our students to conduct themselves in a professional manner. Grounds for termination include the following: non-payment of tuition, failure to attend classes, excessive tardiness or not achieving a satisfactory level of competency, using foul language, and having possession of drugs, alcohol or firearms on the school grounds. If a student is terminated from the program on grounds of misconduct, the student must wait until the next class starts for possible readmission. The student will at that time be on probation.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION:

A Certificate of Completion will be awarded to those students who have maintained a score of 75% or higher, have maintained a 75% attendance, have met all financial obligations, have successfully demonstrated their abilities as a Dental Assistant and have successfully completed the required Dental Assisting 80 hours of externship in a local, recommended dental office during the 11th and 12 week of the course. If all course work is complete and the student is delayed in completing their externship within 12 weeks, the certificate will be awarded once the externship is complete.

TYPE OF CERTIFICATE, DIPLOMA, OR DEGREE AWARDED

Certificate of Completion

WITHHOLDING RECORDS:

The school has the right to withhold the Certificate of Completion if the student has not paid the tuition in full by the time of course completion.

INCOMPLETES, WITHDRAWALS, REPEAT SUBJECTS AND REMEDIAL WORK

A student who is obligated for the full tuition may request a grade of "incomplete" if the student withdraws for an appropriate reason unrelated to the student's academic status. A student receiving a grade of incomplete may reenroll in the program during the 12-month period following the date the student withdraws and complete those incomplete subjects without payment of additional tuition. If too much time has passed, the student may choose to repeat those subjects already taken as a refresher subject without payment of additional tuition.

SCHOOL PLACEMENT ASSISTANCE POLICY

The school will assist the students in preparing resumes for their future employment. The school will also assist in job placement; however, the school does not in any way guarantee employment.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICY

Milestone Dental Assisting School is committed to maintaining a learning environment that is free from sexual harassment, discrimination, intimidation, and retaliation. Sexual harassment is prohibited and will not be tolerated in any form. This policy applies to all students, instructors, staff members, applicants, visitors, and any individual participating in school-sponsored activities or training.

Retaliation against any individual who reports sexual harassment, participates in an investigation, or opposes conduct believed to violate this policy is strictly prohibited. Any act of retaliation will be treated as a separate violation of school policy. If an investigation determines that a violation of this policy has occurred, the school will take appropriate corrective action, which may include counseling, written warnings, suspension, dismissal from the program, termination of employment, or other measures deemed appropriate under the circumstances.

Students who believe their concerns have not been adequately addressed by the school may also contact the appropriate state or federal agency responsible for enforcing anti-discrimination laws.

Milestone Dental Assisting School is committed to providing all students and staff with a safe, respectful, and professional educational environment free from harassment and discrimination.

EXTERNSHIPS

80 hours of Dental Assisting externship is necessary for the student to receive hands-on experience working with actual patients in a dental office. We have approved local dental offices to participate with student externships. After the student has completed their 10th week of class, a dental office will be matched to the student to begin participating in their externship. It is recommended that 8 hours be completed in a day for 5 days a week for 2 weeks. This will give the student an idea of what to expect during an actual workday. The externship must be completed before receiving a Certificate of Completion. If the student needs longer than two weeks to complete their externship, the Certificate of Completion will be withheld until the 80 hours are completed.

There should be a maximum of 2 students at any given dental office at a time during the externship with a maximum of 20 students completing their externship in the program at any given time. The school is continuously communicating with dental offices to ensure there are enough offices to host externships.

The school will contact the dental offices where externships are being done on a weekly basis either by phone or in person. This will ensure that the offices are able to allow the student hands on experience and are not just observing.

Students are encouraged to share their experiences of their externships verbally during class time.

An "Externship Evaluation Form" will be filled out by the dental office for each extern at the completion of their externship.

A daily form will be filled out by the student to keep track of which procedures they assist with, x-rays taken, etc.

Students are to keep a daily journal of their observations and experiences during their externships.

A final report of 1 page in length will be written by the students on completion of their externship describing what they have learned while working in the dental office.
